While Duranty as the Moscow correspondent for The New York Times was contributing to disinformation on a monstrous scale, in 1932-33 the genocidal man-made famine (Holodomor) raged in Soviet Ukraine, orchestrated by Joseph Stalin and his government. Millions died and the United States recognized the Soviet Union diplomatically giving it entry into the League of Nations. All was covered up.

Walter Duranty received the prestigious journalism Pulitzer Prize for his articles in 1932 on Stalin's Collectivization Program, which led to the famine of Holodomor.

The Pulitzer Committee states, that it awards its prize on "excellence in journalism, capturing events accurately as they occur". Giving a Pulitzer Prize to an opportunistic journalist, who falsified the truth and lied to the American public does not meet the standards of the Pulitzer Committee
